St. Aloysius Parish was established in 1898. The first Mass was said in 1900. From its earliest days, the parish had an outreach to the neighborhood to assist families with food, clothing, and housing needs. Tax exempt status was granted in 1946. From the early years of the parish, the St. Vincent de Paul Society was active in providing assistance to both parishioners and neighborhood families.

When the Marianist community came to St. Aloysius in 1980, Father Reichert became director of the Hunger Center. He was followed by a succession of Marianist brothers until the Marianists withdrew from the parish in 2015. Our present director, Ms. Carol Bunn has been the director of the Hunger Center since 2015. She has expanded the ministry to include working with Court Appointed Community Service workers, managing the St. Vincent de Paul funds for rental and utility assistance, and coordinating with the following agencies.

Greater Cleveland Food Bank – We are a partner with them and regularly receive food from them.

Famicos - This housing network maintains a number of senior citizen apartments in the area. Food from our hunger center is delivered to the residents on a regular basis.

We Think for Change – This organization addresses the needs of senior citizens who are dealing with AIDS. They assist in our food pantry especially during the spring and summer months when we receive large donations of fresh fruits and vegetables. Our pantry also provides food for their members which they deliver to their homes.

NBCA – National Black Council on Aging – Sends senior citizens to agencies to receive training in office skills, etc. Individuals are paid by the council and serve at an agency for two years and then hopefully move on to full time employment.

Oak Tree Health and Metro Health – social workers from these two agencies contact us when clients in our service area need food, rental, or utility assistance.

Project Hope – A medical assistance program that rents space in St. Aloysius rectory helps to address physical needs of our clients. They provide a monthly foot clinic for the neighborhood.

The following groups provide volunteer hours in the Hunger Center: John Carroll, Beaumont, Shaker Heights High School, Hawken School.

#### III. Project/Program Description

Project Overview – Describe the specific purpose of the project and how funds will be spent.

This project will specifically address the need to respond to increased requests for food and shelter. Requests for food, rental assistance, and utility assistance have increased by 25% weekly. Funds from this project will be used to purchase additional food from the food bank, assist individuals and families who qualify for rental and utility assistance, and to pay the hunger center director for her additional hours. The Cleveland Food Bank has stopped delivering food to individuals and senior apartment complexes. If someone lives near our established delivery routes, we have taken on these additional clients. Carol Bunn, the hunger center director was trained by the Cleveland Clergy Alliance to become a "navigator". In this role, she directed seniors to various agencies that could help them. She also assisted them with necessary paper work and documentation of their needs. Cleveland Clergy Alliance no longer pays its navigators but Carol still works additional hours to see that our senior citizens can access the help they need.

Project Details – What do the project needed? Who will participate in your project? What specific activities will you do to achieve your goals?

As a result of this project, we hope to be able to increase the number of you hope to achieve? Why is persons / households served through our Hunger Center by 20-25% in the next 12 months. This project is needed because of the additional clients who are calling us for assistance in areas of food, housing, utilities, furniture, and clothing.

> We have recently become aware of an abandoned house in the area in which a number of homeless people are living. We are working with them to provide food, blankets, sleeping bags, and other necessities as well as directing them to agencies that can provide more permanent shelter.

The Hunger Center Director, her assistants, and volunteers, and the parish staff will all participate in this project.

Specific activities will include: Increasing the number of days and hours that the phone is actively covered. Increasing the number of deliveries to clients in our area. Increasing staff hours for interviews of clients requesting assistance.

The Hunger Center is staffed by Ms. Carol Bunn, the director; two part time senior citizens who are paid by the National Black Council on Aging, volunteer drivers, and additional volunteers from both our parish and the neighborhood.

Ms. Carol Bunn has worked as the director of our hunger center for the past 10 years. She has been recognized by the Cleveland Food bank for her dedication and competency in handling this most demanding job. She is a Marine who actively served in the military. She is also trained as a Court Community Service Supervisor and a Bankruptcy Advisor.

The project helps St. Aloysius Parish meet its mission of providing hope, empowerment, and compassion to God's people in the surrounding neighborhoods.
